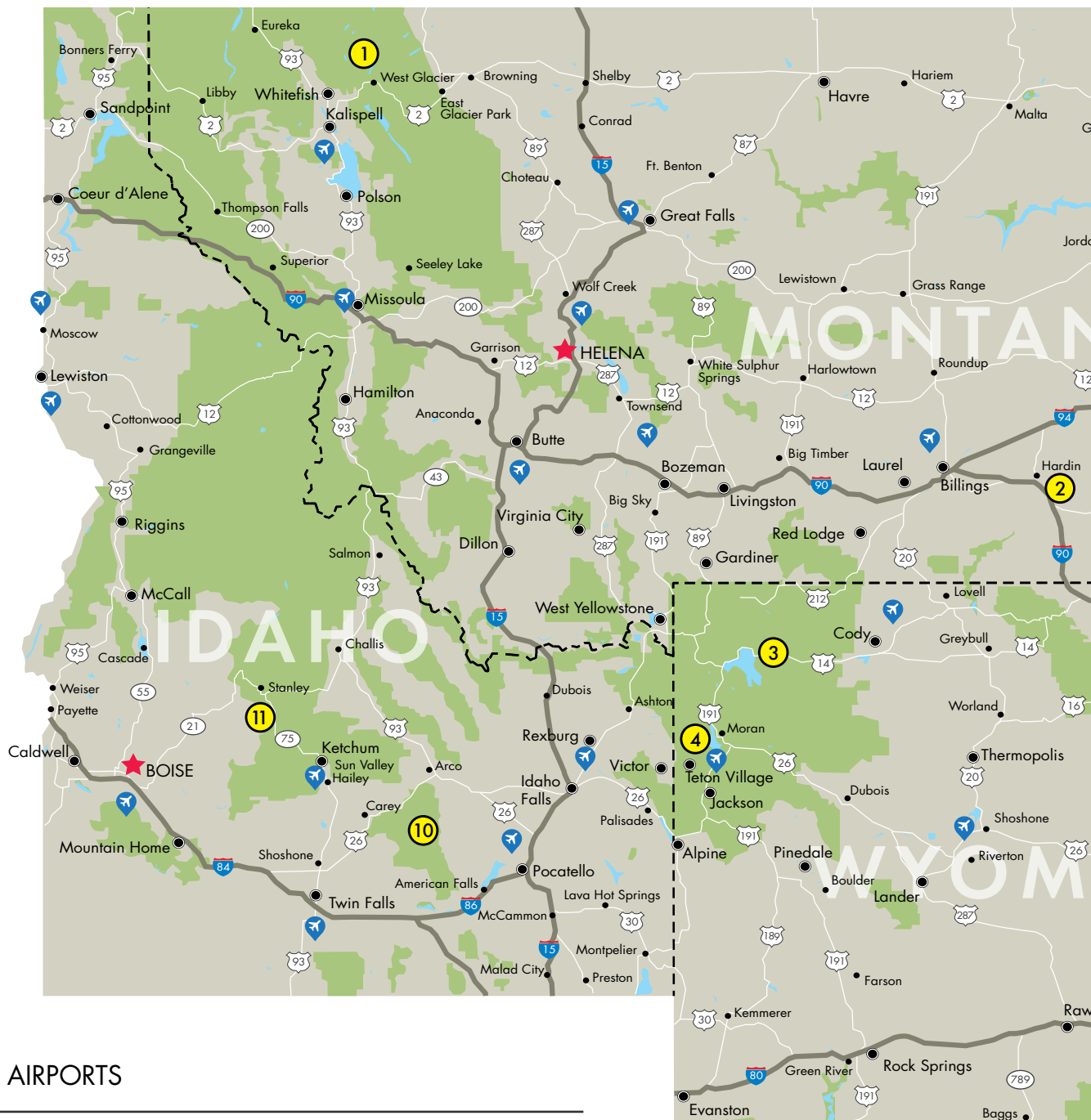

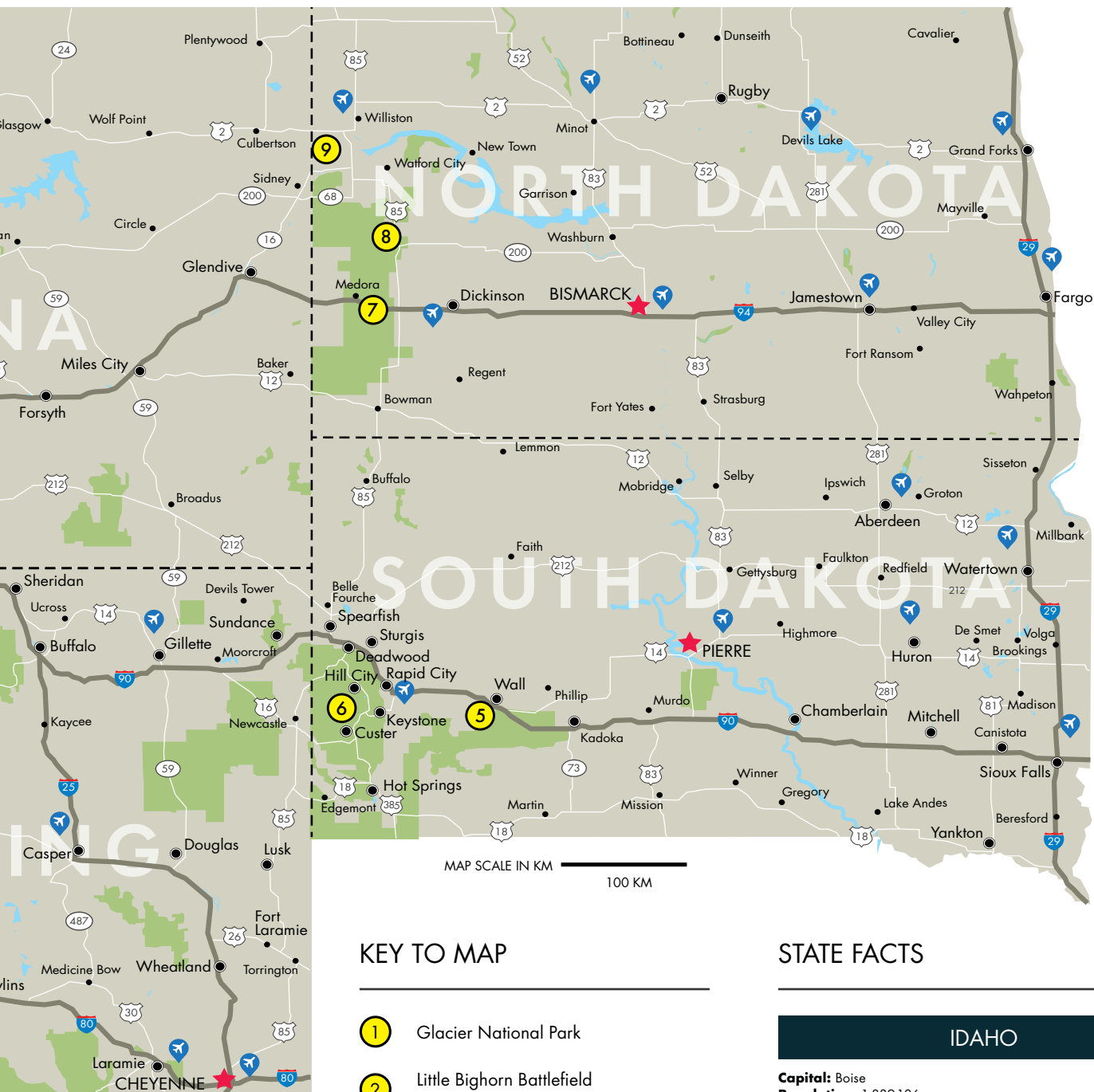

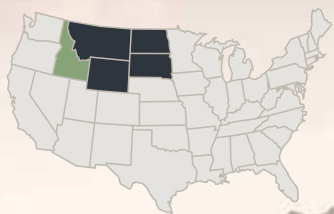

Home to the largest contiguous wilderness in the continental U.S., Idaho has no shortage of places to explore.

SAWTOOTH NATIONAL RECREATION AREA

Idaho is where adventure awaits and cultural experiences are best shared. Enjoy beautiful moments reeling in your next big catch in one of the many blue-ribbon rivers or marveling at the roaring flows of Mesa Falls or Shoshone Falls, the Niagara of the West. Get your thrills exploring ancient lava tubes at Craters of the Moon National Monument & Preserve, touring the silver mines in Wallace, or standing atop granite giants at City of Rocks National Reserve. Make memories twirling with Basque dancers at the annual San Inazio Festival in Boise, cheering on your favorite cowboy at a rodeo or singing along to a tune at Treefort Music Fest.

NATIVE AMERICAN HERITAGE:

- From the Beginning – Follow the creation story of the Nimiipuu as you wander through Nez Perce National Historical Park sites.
- Her-story – Uncover tales of Sacajawea and the Agai'dika Shoshone-Bannock tribes at the Sacajawea Interpretive, Cultural & Educational Center in Salmon.
- Ancient History – Discover petroglyphs from thousands of years ago while wandering through Celebration Park, Idaho's first archaeological park.

UNDER-THE-RADAR SPOTS:

- Unique History – The Museum at the Brig at Farragut State Park gives a glimpse into a WWII training facility with boot camp, naval and war memorabilia.
- Prehistoric Fossils – Hagerman Fossil Beds National Monument is home to one of the world's richest Pliocene fossil sites, located next to the many stunning waterfalls of Thousand Springs State Park.
- Frontier Days – Pay a visit to Land of the Yankee Fork State Park, which brings Idaho's mining past to life.



MEMORABLE MOMENTS:

- Embrace Dark Skies – Take in the Milky Way, letting the constellations and night sky unfold before your eyes as you enjoy a night at a remote cabin, in a camper van or at your new favorite campsite. Some great places for breathtaking nighttime views include Central Idaho's International Dark Sky Reserve, City of Rocks National Reserve and Bruneau Dunes State Park.
- Hot Springs – From naturally heated geothermal pools formed alongside a flowing river to fully developed resort retreats, one of Idaho's 130-plus hot springs will help soak away your stress and soothe your aching muscles after a day of adventure.
- Trail Rides – Embrace your inner cowboy discovering the West on horseback, riding numerous trails in the Sawtooth National Recreation Area, around Sandpoint, or just outside Yellowstone National Park at Harriman State Park.



LOWER SALMON RIVER, LEWISTON

HIGHLIGHTS:

- Winter Wonderland – No matter where you are in the state, you are not far from one of Idaho's 19 ski areas, including Hemingway's favorite, Sun Valley.
- A Scenic Route – Idaho has 31 designated scenic byways, each with stunning overlooks. For a quick, action-packed drive, try the Lowman Loop for whitewater rafting, hot springs and wildlife galore intersecting three byways.
- An Unusual Getaway – Sleep among the treetops with a stay in a fire lookout for a bird's-eye view of the sun as it rises and sets over the mountaintops.
- Our Local Libations – With booming viticulture and agricultural industries, Idaho has more than 60 wineries and 80 breweries and is the number one producer of barley and the number two producer of hops in the U.S. The state's three AVAs, or unique grape growing regions, combine for more than 1,300 acres of vineyards.

SOUTHWEST IDAHO



Southwest Idaho delivers big on outdoor adventure, especially in the cities of Boise and McCall. Find the best of the West here: rugged foothills and mountains paired with wide-open spaces; rivers renowned for both fishing and world-class rapids; and scenic byways that beg you to take the road less traveled.

BOISE

Surrounded by foothills and nestled along the Boise River, Idaho's state capital offers easy access to hiking, mountain biking and kayaking. Cyclists take to the Boise River Greenbelt, a 40-km paved route through the city dotted with parks, restaurants, urban wineries, breweries and cideries. Thrill-seekers head north of Boise to the Payette River for guided rafting trips with Cascade Raft. Rock climbers will be impressed with Boise's Black Cliffs, known for crags that appeal to beginners and experts alike.

Named one of America's Next Great Food Cities by Food & Wine, Boise's culinary scene is not to be missed. The Warehouse, Boise's new food hall, is making headlines with its 10 eateries and two bars. Just a short drive from the Sunnyslope wine region, Boise boasts an impressive number of tasting rooms – so many that there is an urban wine tour for those who prefer to stay in the city limits.

SCENIC BYWAYS

Road trips reach a new level with the region's abundance of scenic byways. Start in Boise and take the Payette River Scenic Byway on Highway 55 to McCall, meandering through stunning wilderness, including riverways and national forests. Small towns pepper the scenic byways, including Horseshoe Bend, Donnelly and Cascade. Don't miss Volcanic Pies in Horseshoe Bend for the perfect fresh-baked dessert to take along on your adventure.

MCCALL

Approximately 170 km north of Boise, McCall sits on Payette Lake, with 5,330 acres of glacial water ideal for all types of water sports. Whether swimming, sailing, waterskiing, jet skiing, canoeing, kayaking, stand-up paddleboarding or boating, the lake offers endless activities. You can also relax and enjoy a scenic boat ride with McCall Lake Cruises.

Idaho has the most kilometers of whitewater rafting in the lower 48, so it's no surprise that McCall, like Boise, is a perfect basecamp for rafters. Book a trip with any of the Payette or South Salmon River outfitters, or use McCall as the gateway for a rafting, jet boat or fishing expedition further north with Hells Canyon Adventures.

With more than 800 km of public trails to explore, the region offers top-notch views for hikers and horseback riders alike. Ya-Hoo Corrals in McCall lets you take in the Great American West with guided tours. Every hiker will find a trail to their liking, whether a kid-friendly loop in Ponderosa State Park or something more challenging.

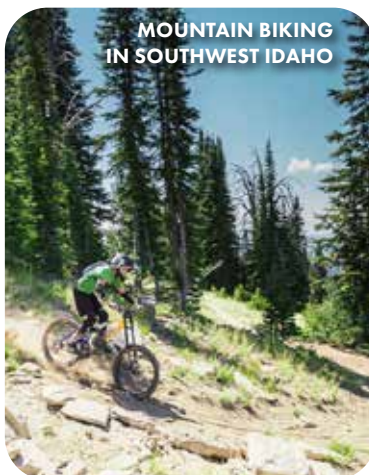

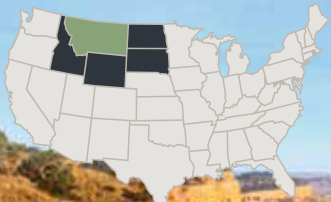

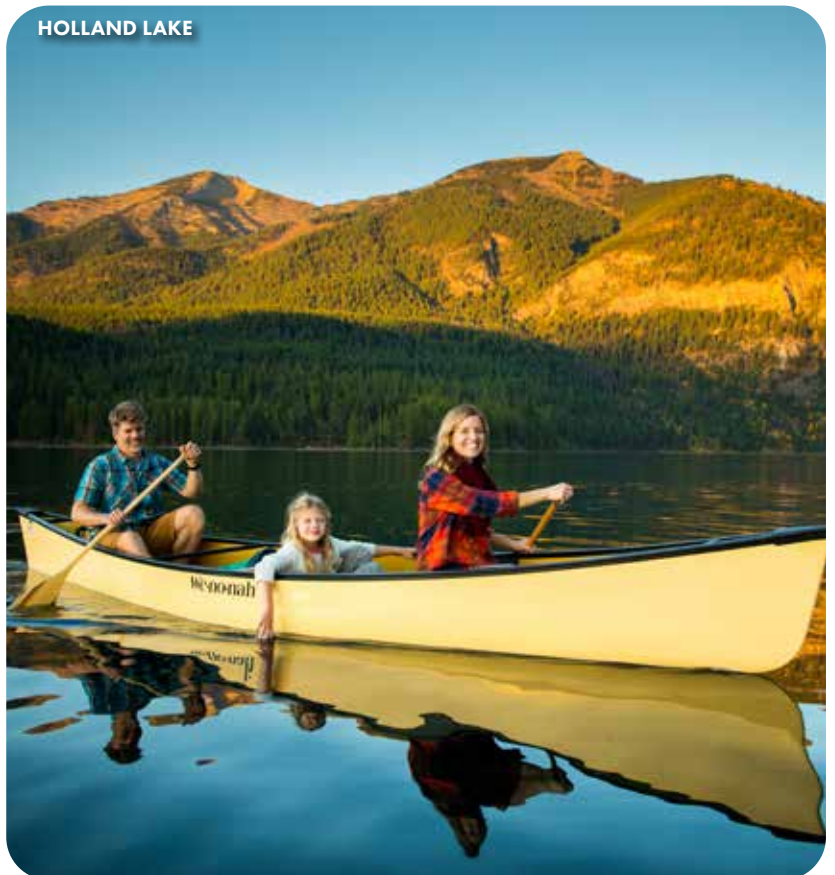
Welcome to Big Sky Country. With more wildlife than people, America's fourth-largest state gives new meaning to the phrase "wide-open spaces."

Anchored by two national parks and countless natural wonders, Montana boasts a whopping 55 state parks and endless expanses of wilderness to get lost in the right direction. The fly fishing is world-class, the whitewater beguiling and the landscape begging to be explored. Glacier National Park's famed glaciers, alpine meadows, verdant forests, roaring waterfalls and towering peaks set the scene for adventure where 700 miles of hiking trails and views await. Montana is the setting of "A River Runs Through It," and with good reason – water is the state's lifeblood, while the mountains are the playground.

RELAX AND UNWIND:

- Soak in Hot Springs – Let your cares melt away at the natural mineral pools of Yellowstone Hot Springs in Gardiner or plan an adults-only escape to Quinn's Hot Springs for a romantic overnight getaway.
- Embrace Your Inner Cowboy at a Luxury Guest Ranch – The Ranch at Rock Creek is the world's first Forbes Five Star Guest Ranch, combining frontier traditions with all-inclusive luxury.
- Get Off the Grid – Discover hidden spots along Flathead Lake on a kayak or boat tour to Wildhorse Island State Park. Once a haven for the Salish-Kootenai Indians to protect their horses from neighbouring tribes, it still has five wild horses that roam free.

GREAT AMERICAN WEST HERITAGE:

- See One of the Largest Buffalo Jump Sites in North America – First Peoples Buffalo Jump State Park is a National Historic Landmark and archaeological site. Walk the interpretive trails to take in the story of buffalo culture.
- Learn About the Land on a Native Sun Tours – Get a deeper understanding of Glacier National Park's sacred sites on a tour with Blackfeet tribal members. They'll provide storytelling about the animals, plants used for nutrition and medicine, and the land's spirituality.
- Experience a Powwow – Attend Crow Fair, an end-of-summer bonanza when the sleepy town of Crow Agency morphs into the Tipi Capital of the World, or visit Browning in July for North American Indian Days Powwow celebration.

HIGHLIGHTS:

- Go For a Drive – Montana is one place where it's easy to take the scenic route. The Anaconda-Pintler Scenic Route skirts along mountains, creeks and lakes, while the breathtaking vistas of the Going-to-the-Sun Road make for another memorable road trip. History buffs should drive the Pioneer Mountains Scenic Byway to the ghost town of Coolidge for a look back into Montana's mining past.
- Watery Wonders – For over 125 years, guests have followed Lewis and Clark's path along the Missouri River. Best seen on a Gates of the Mountains boat tour outside Helena, this family-friendly, open-air boat takes you through a rock formation that looks like granite gates for a history and nature lesson all wrapped into one.
- Walk in Dinosaurs' Footsteps – Go back in time on the Montana Dinosaur Trail, a series of 14 dinosaur-themed museums showcasing prehistoric discoveries. Grab a prehistoric passport and get your paleontology on.

NEVADA CITY GHOST TOWN

UNDER-THE-RADAR SPOTS:

- Explore Red Lodge – The basecamp of the Beartooth Mountains, this quirky town has an unexpectedly excellent culinary scene, local boutiques and galleries, and the Yellowstone Wildlife Sanctuary, where you can get up close and personal with wild cats, wolves and reptiles.
- See Mermaids – Drink your cares away while watching mermaids swim by at the retro tiki bar, Sip & Dip Lounge in Great Falls.
- Get Spooked – Go back to the Gold Rush era and tour Garnet ghost town outside Missoula, where more than 30 buildings have been preserved.

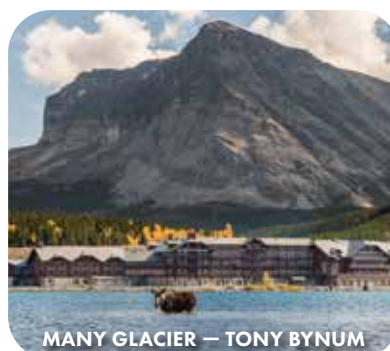

The Crown of the Continent – Glacier National Park – anchors the region with more than 1 million acres of jaw-dropping terrain. 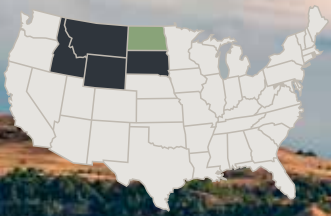

NORTH DAKOTA

One of America's best-kept secrets, North Dakota is laced with history and intertwined with adventure.

THEODORE ROOSEVELT NATIONAL PARK

Whether you crave creature comforts or the rugged outdoors, from the Red River Valley to the rolling hills of the drift prairie, the North Dakota landscape is as beguiling as the opportunities that await. Attend a powwow, rodeo or state fair to soak up the culture and get a living history lesson. Theodore Roosevelt, George Armstrong Custer, Sitting Bull, Sakakawea, and Lewis and Clark lived and left their legacies here. Walk in their footsteps and take in their stories while crafting your own legend and memories.

GREAT AMERICAN WEST HERITAGE:

- Tribal Tourism – Home to seven tribes on five tribal lands, check out the Mandan, Hidatsa, Arikara Earth Lodge Village, the new MHA Interpretive Center and the Knife River Indian Village National Historic Site, where Lewis and Clark met Sakakawea.
- Mandan Rodeo Days – The world's oldest rodeo began over the July 4th weekend in 1879 and continues every Independence Day weekend in Mandan. This event includes three days of PRCA rodeo, specialty acts, fireworks, street dances and more.
- Powwows – Originally held in the spring to celebrate the beginning of new life, powwows are now held throughout the year as a time for people to gather, sing, dance, feast and pray.
- Killdeer Mountain Four Bears Scenic Byway – This 64-mile byway provides a unique look into the culture and history of the Mandan, Hidatsa and Arikara tribes, along with cowboy and rodeo lifestyles. Points of Interest include Crow Flies High Butte Overlook, Four Bears Museum, Earth Lodge Village at New Town, Little Missouri State Park, Killdeer Battlefield State Historic Site and Lake Ilo National Wildlife Refuge.



UTTC INTERNATIONAL POWWOW



SCANDINAVIAN HERITAGE PARK

GET CULTURED:

- Visit Scandinavian Heritage Park – The only outdoor museum in the world dedicated to all five Nordic countries, you can learn about Denmark, Finland, Iceland, Norway and Sweden by exploring a 240-year-old log house, replica stabbur, 27-foot-tall Swedish Dala horse, Gol Stave Church, Finnish sauna and Danish windmill.
- Admire Flora and Fauna at the International Peace Garden – Home to over 150,000 flowers in the formal garden and conservatory, this botanical paradise also has one of the largest collections of cacti in the world.
- Have a Museum Day – The North Dakota Heritage Center and State Museum is the centerpiece of North Dakota's museum network. Free and open to the public, the 97,000-square-foot facility tells the story of the state with galleries from the Ice Age to the present day. Enjoy performances in the new digital Great Plains Theater and lunch at the cafe.

HIGHLIGHTS:

- Unique Festivals – From Native American history to Viking traditions, the United Tribes International Powwow and Norsk Høstfest bring two very different cultures to the forefront.
- Quaint Downtowns – Explore the towns of Fargo, Grand Forks, Bismarck, Minot, Valley City and Medora, all full of charming main streets, locally owned boutiques and tasty bites.
- Abundant Outdoor Adventures – 70,000 square miles of rugged terrain, sparkling waters and clean air all scream adventure. There's something special about getting outside in North Dakota, whether you're reeling in a walleye on Lake Sakakawea, reaching the summit of a hike through the Badlands or sleeping under the stars at a state park.

- White Horse Hill National Game Preserve – Drive the 4-mile loop looking for bison and elk herds, stop at the prairie dog town, see more than 250 species of birds, take a hike and explore the habitats.
- Sheyenne River Valley National Scenic Byway – North Dakota's first nationally recognised scenic byway, this 63-mile route puts archaeology, history, culture and recreation on full display.

BISMARCK-MANDAN, NORTH DAKOTA

LEWIS & CLARK RIVERBOAT CRUISING THE MISSOURI RIVER

The Bismarck-Mandan area of North Dakota is rich with history, both indoors and out.

Experience the state's early days at Fort Abraham Lincoln State Park overlooking the Missouri River Valley, where Gen. George Armstrong Custer and the 7th Cavalry rode to their legendary battle at the Little Bighorn. At the nearby On-A-Slant Indian Village, experience the prairie lifestyle of the Indians who lived there from 1575-1781. The Lewis and Clark Trail, meanwhile, takes visitors to the still-unspoiled landscape first witnessed by the famous explorers in the early 1800s.

Cruise the majestic Missouri River on the Lewis & Clark Riverboat or view some native North American habitats at the Dakota Zoo. Visit Bismarck's historic Cathedral District, with homes on the National Registry of Historic Places, then shop at the quaint stores and boutiques in Bismarck-Mandan.

Hungry? Sample amazing ethnic foods from North Dakota. Enjoy the treasures of one of numerous locally owned restaurants. Feast on wild game, or enjoy mouth-watering walleye, which are plentiful in the region's freshwater lakes and rivers.

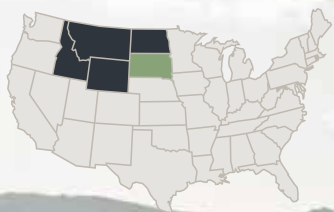

Marvel at history carved in stone and thousands of free-roaming buffalo, or hike the highest natural point east of the Rocky Mountains. Get off the grid by UTV, Jeep or mountain bike; see wildlife and wildflowers; or go back in time digging for fossils.

GREAT AMERICAN WEST HERITAGE:

- Learn About Native Americans – For a look into their way of life and connection to the land, the Oglala Lakota Living History Village offers stories and songs told by the Lakota people.
- Pay Tribute to the Past – The Crazy Horse Memorial is the world's largest mountain carving and a spellbinding tribute to the heroic Oglala Lakota warrior who stood up for what he believed in as he fought against Custer's army.
- See The Wild, Wild West – Full of outlaws, gold-seekers, characters and re-enactors, Deadwood is a rough-and-tumble 1800s Gold Rush town. Tour the Days of '76 Museum, which honours pioneers and prospectors, year-round or plan your trip around the Days of '76 Rodeo, Deadwood's annual event.
- Walk (or Drive!) in their Footsteps – The Native American National & State Scenic Byway provides breathtaking views of the Missouri River, diverse landscapes, and tribal history and culture through central South Dakota.

HIGHLIGHTS:

- Mount Rushmore National Memorial – Near Keystone, the majestic figureheads of George Washington, Thomas Jefferson, Theodore Roosevelt and Abraham Lincoln are a dedication to American change-makers.
- Badlands National Park – Called the land of stone and light, the rugged beauty of the Badlands puts a variety of ecosystems and striking geologic deposits on full display south of Wall.
- Custer State Park – South Dakota's first and largest state park. Drive the Wildlife Loop to see thousands of free-range bison, prairie dogs and other unique animals, which are especially impressive during the Annual Fall Buffalo Roundup event.
- Falls Park – The number one attraction in Sioux Falls, this urban waterfall is complete with a five-story observation deck, Stockyards AG Experience attraction and local restaurant Overlook Cafe.

- John Lopez Studio/Kokomo Gallery – Large-scale and intricate fantastical welded beasts made of repurposed metal symbolise Western life in Lemmon. One of his most recognizable pieces of work, "Dignity: of Earth and Sky," is located on the banks of the Missouri river near Chamberlain
- Sylvan Lake at Custer State Park – A favourite cool-down spot for photographers, artists and anyone looking for a lake getaway, the watery wonderland was featured in the movie "National Treasure 2: Book of Secrets."
- Faulkton Grain Elevator Mural – Painted by a world-renowned Australian artist, this photorealist mural of two kids welcomes you to Faulkton, one of the most significant pieces of public art in the state.

- Have a Dino-mite Time – See Ice Age fossils and tour an active indoor dig site at the Mammoth Site in Hot Springs.
- Explore the Newest State Park – Good Earth at Blood Run is a National Historic Landmark with evidence of some of the longest human habitation in the nation across the fertile floodplains.
- Get a History Lesson – Nestled into a bluff near Pierre, The South Dakota Cultural Heritage Center is the headquarters of the State Historical Society, the state archives, and rotating and permanent exhibits.

MONTANA

Whether you're looking for a relaxing float or a rip-roaring ride, the Gallatin River, Albion Gorge and Flathead River exhilarate thrill- and chill-seekers. Get active hiking, biking or camping at Montana's largest state park, Makoshika, which features badland formations, big skies and dinosaur fossils. Explore one of the most diverse ecosystems on Earth in Yellowstone, home to almost half the world's active geysers, before heading north and west to Paradise Valley and Madison Valley for more wildlife and geologic wonders. Gear up with world-class mountain biking and hiking in the capital city of Helena with 80 miles of trails accessible from downtown.



HELLS CANYON, ID

NORTH DAKOTA

Before there were roads, the Missouri River was your guide, inviting you to kayak or fish the longest river in America. Swim, sun or sail on Lake Sakakawea, the third-largest man-made reservoir in the U.S. With more shoreline than California, it's home to the North Country National Scenic Trail, stretching 4,600 miles to Vermont. Devils Lake, the state's largest natural body of water, is known as the "Perch Capital of the World," but anglers can also reel in walleye, northern pike and white bass. Traverse the Badlands' 144-mile Maah Daah Hey Trail on foot, horseback or bike (it has earned an EPIC designation from the International Mountain Biking Association). Get off the grid in Pembina Gorge State Recreation Area, one of the largest uninterrupted stretches of woodlands in the state.

SOUTH DAKOTA

With 100 miles of converted railroad bridges and tunnels, the Mickelson Trail is beloved by hikers, bikers and horseback riders. Go deep into Black Hills National Forest on 650 miles of ATV and UTV trails. Drive Spearfish Canyon Scenic Byway, stopping to cast a line, stretch your legs and marvel at the waterfalls. Explore Missouri National Recreational River, a 100-mile stretch of North America's largest river. Visit Badlands National Park, the crown jewel of South Dakota, and explore the underground worlds of Wind Cave and Jewel Cave, where miles upon miles await beneath the Earth's surface. Winter is the secret season for frozen landscapes and fewer crowds.



WIND RIVER CANYON, THERMOPOLIS

WYOMING

Whether you wind through Wind River Canyon, snake down the Shoshone or hit the Big Kahuna, whitewater rafting in Wyoming can be an adrenaline rush or a scenic float – the choice is yours. Surrounded by stark red canyons and lush green forest, Flaming Gorge is a mecca for fishing, boating, hiking and biking, where wild horses roam and adventure awaits. Home to more than 40 peaks over 4 km tall, seven of the largest glaciers in the Rocky Mountains and the natural phenomenon in Sinks Canyon State Park, the Wind River area is one of Wyoming's premier playgrounds. Fossil Butte National Monument, "America's aquarium in stone," is home to some of the world's best-preserved fossils.

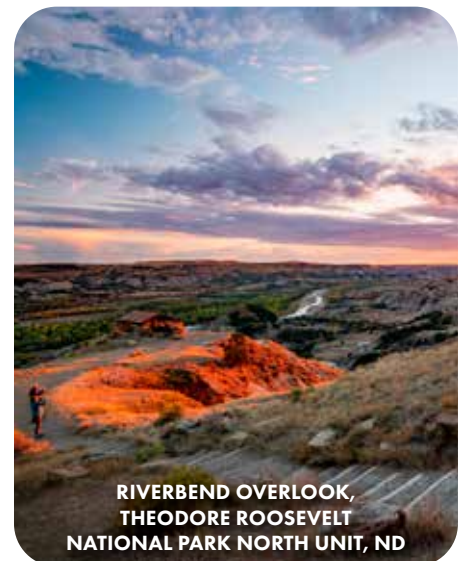

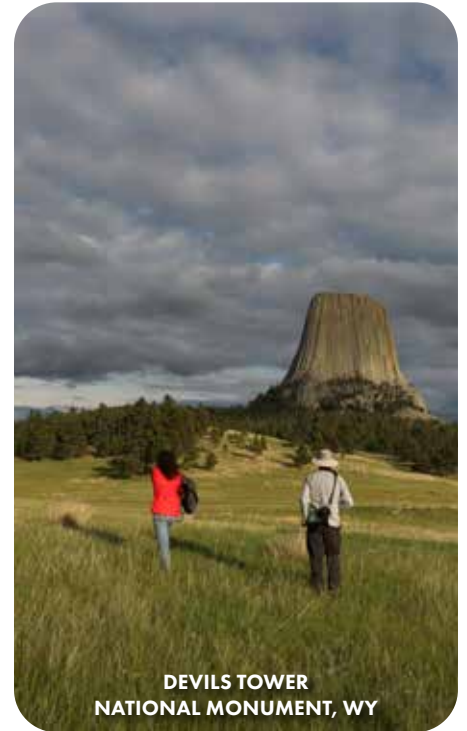

STATE PARKS ITINERARY (7-10 DAYS)

With over 150 state parks spread across five states, you could spend weeks exploring and still not scratch the surface of the numerous breathtaking outdoor recreational areas. These are some of the standout adventures you just can't miss when visiting the Great American West.

DAY 1: WYOMING – With Denver as your gateway to the region, head north toward Curt Gowdy State Park. After a two-hour drive, you'll be itching to explore its seven distinct landscapes, which include three reservoirs. Continue north to Guernsey State Park, one of the area's premier camping destinations. Spend the night under the stars or keep heading on toward Hot Springs State Park, where the naturally heated, free-flowing mineral pools beckon.

DAY 2-3: SOUTH DAKOTA – Make your way east to Custer State Park, known as the crown jewel of the Black Hills region. Here, you'll find free-roaming buffalo, towering granite peaks and epic views. When you've had your fill of wildlife and wilderness, continue on to Lewis & Clark Recreation Area. With three separate campgrounds, you can rest your head or take advantage of the waterfront alongside the Missouri River. Just north of Sioux Falls, Palisades State Park is another must-see, and one of the most unique views in South Dakota with scenic Sioux quartzite cliff overlooks, an ideal backdrop for your photo op. Continue north to explore picturesque Fort Sisseton Historic State Park.

DAY 4-5: NORTH DAKOTA – Cross into North Dakota for a visit to Fort Ransom State Park. A tribute to the state's homesteading heritage, the heavily wooded area is the start of the Sheyenne River Valley National Scenic Byway. Fort Abraham Lincoln State Park is home to a replica Indian Village and reconstructed military buildings. Beat the heat at Lake Sakakawea State Park, the third-largest man-made reservoir in the nation; Lake Metigoshe State Park, which straddles the U.S.-Canada border; or Little Missouri State Park, an oasis on the edge of the Badlands.



DAY 6-7: MONTANA – Cross into Montana to the sandstone formations and fossils of Makoshika State Park. Then head toward Billings to Chief Plenty Coups State Park, a national historic landmark, and Pictograph Cave State Park for more prehistoric discoveries. From there, journey underground to see geological wonders at Lewis & Clark Caverns State Park or step back in time at Bannack State Park, home of the state's first gold rush. You'll overnight at Missouri Headwaters State Park, where the Lewis and Clark Expedition camped in 1805.

DAY 8-9: IDAHO – Start winding your way southwest with a stop at Harriman State Park for a taste of Yellowstone's landscape before making your way across the state to Bruneau Dunes State Park, the tallest stand-alone sand dune in North America. Another natural wonder, Thousand Springs State Park, is known for its numerous waterfalls that spring from the canyon walls. Spend the night at Castle Rock State Park, a mecca for climbers, hikers and bikers.

DAY 10: IDAHO – Complete the loop with a visit to the turquoise-blue waters at Bear Lake State Park. Bring your swimsuit for a dip in the water before drying off during one last hike on one of the many scenic hiking trails.

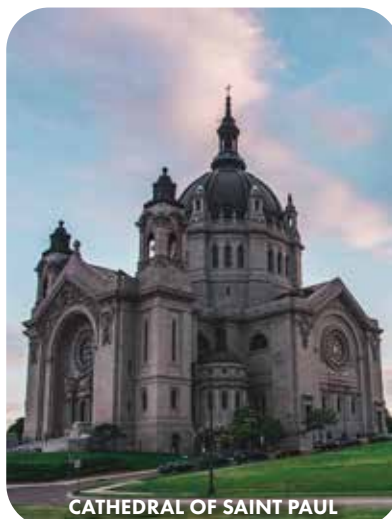

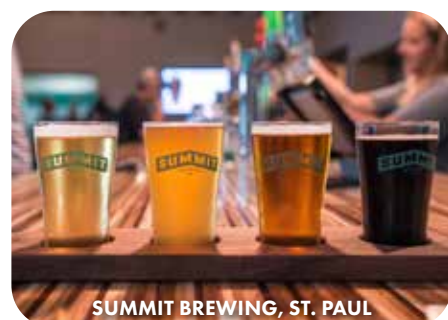
